

EIGHT TEAMS SURE FOR CIRCUIT

A. A. U. LEAGUE TO MEET TOMORROW

There will be at least eight teams in the A. A. U. Basketball league. This is almost certain although some of the entries have not yet been made in writing. The entry lists will close tonight at 10 o'clock at the Y. M. C. A.

C. A. Pease, physical director of the Y. M. C. A., announced this morning that the league is almost certain of eight teams. The All-Around Chinese have already made their application to join. Ben Clerk of Palama states that he has about 100 men at Palama Settlement from which to pick a team for league entry.

The Braves have already organized their team and Cecil Benny has filed an application for entry. The Waikikis are positive entrants in the circuit and have practically completed signing up their men.

The Outrigger Canoe club has two first-class teams and if necessary will enter both in the series. The Asahis have also made application for entry in the league. The Honolulu Athletic club has not made written application but word has been given that its team is already organized.

In spite of the fact that it was announced that certain Healanis members had stated that they would play for the Waikikis, the Healanis will file application for entry with the A. A. U. league. Jack Longley stated this morning that if the team which wants four players in question, makes

proper request for these men for the basketball series only, it may be arranged.

The organization of the A. A. U. league will take place at a meeting to be held at 7 o'clock in the Y. M. C. A. tomorrow night.
