spirit seemed to be unbeatable and they showed the heavier High school "Varsities" how to play the game. Many times they were outweighed by over ten pounds—a terrible handicap to place on any team. This is where the open style of play came in handy and Kauhaue's "kids," as they were called used this system to the limit. In their final game against the Alameda High "varsity" the Puns were outweighed 15 pounds and yet put up one of the fiercest games ever staged on St. Mary's field. The score was 7-0 in favor of the heavier team.

Clarence Lane who has made a name for himself in the swimming world by breaking several world's records, is also a great football player. When the St. Mary's Varsity was disbanded in mid-season, Lane was given charge of the Victors, known as the lightest and fastest team in the U. S. His team went through a season of ten games without ever losing or tying a contest. Lane received the commendation of the faculty along with Kauhaue for his excellent work performed for the great game.

Thus two former Honolulu athletes have put Hawaii on the map in the football world of California both with their playing for St. Mary's and as coaches. They were known as the two mainstays of the St. Mary's football team this year and last year were ranked with the best on the coast. Kauhaue was mentioned as an All-Pacific Coast half back last year.
