

BLUES HELD ALL COMERS NOW TRY AT THE LOCALS

Angelenos Who Took Measure of the Nevadans and Stanfordites Will Be Here Soon

The first defeat in two years, after they had won the Interecollegiate Championship of the Pacific Coast, was that administered to the Nevada basketball team by the Los Angeles Blues at the University gymnasium in Reno last season. Up until that time the Reno team cleaned up on every team in the list, including the title-winning five from Leland Stanford Jr., University.

Along came the Blues from the city real estate dealers and movie queens, and proceeded to take the Nevadans into camp on the home lot. The scores were close, the Blues taking a seven-point margin in the first contest, winning by a 33 to 26 score. The second game won after a bitter contest by the Angelenos when they squeezed in a four-point lead in the score of 31 to 27.

The Blues, which are now organized under the name of "The City of Los Angeles Basketball Team," will arrive here on the Tenyo Maru, according to advices from Darwin W. Tate, the team manager, on her next visit. While here they will play the winners and runners up in the Oahu Amateur Basketball League.

Play Winners

At present the apparent contenders with the visitors are the Outrigger and National Guard teams. In addition to these two the Blues will tackle the service team having the highest standing in the league, unless such team is either winner or runner up. In that case the service team having the next highest standing will be picked for the match.

While here the Blues will be entertained by local athletic organizations, notably the Outrigger Canoe Club and the Honolulu Service Club. It is possible in view of the fact that the Blues are representing the City of Los Angeles in the first visit of an athletic organization from the southern city, that team will be entertained by other organizations representing Honolulu in an official way.

The lineup as outlined for the team on its visit here will include Skeeter Swan, captain Harry Cooper, and Grover Cate, all of whom were with the Oregon Aggies' five when that team held its record of no defeats for four consecutive years, although taking on all comers of whatever rating. Darwin Tate, formerly the Englewood High School star in Chicago, and All-American high school center and Murray Rock, star amateur forward of the Empire State, are another pair of stars in the squad.
