

Two Teams Fall By Wayside In Inter - Island Struggle

Outrigger Beats Pearls 29 to 14 In Hot Contest
And Guardsmen Outplay the Mauians
In the Second Game, 40 to 23.

THE P. H. A. C. and Maui Alert basketball teams are out of the interisland championship as a result of last night's games at the Armory. The Harbor team was beaten by the Outriggers and the Alerts by the National Guard. The games were played in the order named.

Mayor John Wilson tossed the ball up for the first contest of the evening. Referee Bellows blew his whistle and the mill was on between the Surfers and the Harborites.

The Outriggers looked like anything but championship contenders in the first half of the game. In the first place the lean and lanky forwards for the surfers were too long and lean. Parsons and Wolack, for the Pearls were small and shifty and were galloping in and among the long legs with distressing regularity and effectiveness. In other words they made that particular part of the game look rather squiffy for the surfers. Briggs at center did more than his share and was ably backed up by Velati and Atwood. Taken all the way around the Harbor team made a hit with everybody except their opponents in the first half of last night's game. They played an exceptional game....and just to make it stronger....had never played together as a team before.

Navy scored the first basket of the evening in three minutes and 45 seconds after the game started. Wolack repeated a half minute later after a long pass down the floor. Outrigger was missing basket shots and fumbling passes. The forwards seemed to be confused by the speed of the opposition. At the end of the quarter the score stood P. H. A. C. 4, Outrigger 0.

At the beginning of the second period Swan went in for Outrigger and the surfers began to get better team work on passes, but the Pearls increased their pace and increased their lead. Swan scored first on a free heave. Parsons then looped a long one into the ring for Harbor. Swan hooped another free one and Wolack made things even by nailing Parson's pass and dropping it into the sieve. Heggelstine scored from the floor and made Outrigger's first real basket in the fourth minute of the second quarter. Briggs missed one by a narrow margin but Parsons recovered and scored. He later sunk one from half way down the arena. Nolan was sent in for Heggelstine just before the whistle blew. Score at the end of the quarter was P.H.A.C. 12, Outrigger 4. The bleachers were wild.

Harbor Weakens

In the second half the Pearls began to weaken under a hot attack from the surfers. Heggelstine had replaced Hinton and the Outrigger offensive began to work well. The Harborites were failing to follow the shots and recover misses under the hoop, with the result that the play was against them most of the time. Harbor did not score in this quarter. Nolan rung the bell neatly for the Outrigger and Swan followed suit from the side lines. Heggelstine repeated it. The score was 10 to 12, with Outrigger fighting hard to make up for its past slips. Nolan tied the score on a pass from Swan. Swan dropped a long one in and the

Outriggers took the lead. Navy was rapidly weakening as a result of not recovering after tries. Briggs went in for Hoffman and Ferguson for Velati. Swan scored from beneath the basket just before the end of the period. Score, Outrigger 16, P. H. A. C. 12.

Nolan opened the last period with a score from center. Swan made a free throw. Heggelstine scored on a run past the basket. Wolack made Harbor's last two points by a neat basket. Heggelstine scored and so did Swan. Swan scored again a few seconds later and the game ended Harbor 14, Outrigger 29.

Maui Outclassed

Maui was outclassed by the Honolulu League Champs but made a tough struggle of it. The visitors were unable to make any headway in the shooting in the first quarter and were hopelessly behind when they began to do a little shooting in the last half. Judd scored the first of the game early during the proceedings. Clark hooked one in from a bad angle, Blaisdell to Judd made two more, Clark picked one out of a mad scramble and dumped it in while Bittle followed this lead with one like it. The quarter ended 10-0 in favor of the Guard.

Maui scored seven altogether in the second frame, but Guard had boosted its end of the score to 22 in the meantime. The visitors made their first on a free toss and then Silva dropped three in the hoop in succession for the Mauians. Maui, as all through the game, was working desperately, but seemed to be nervous. They were game, however, although outsped and outweighed.

The third quarter was a repetition of the second. The score at the end was 32 to 14 for the locals. At the end of the fourth it was 40 to 23 the same way.
